Alliteration is something we call a **language feature**. Language features make our writing more exciting and interesting. You should try to use **language features** whenever you can when you're writing!

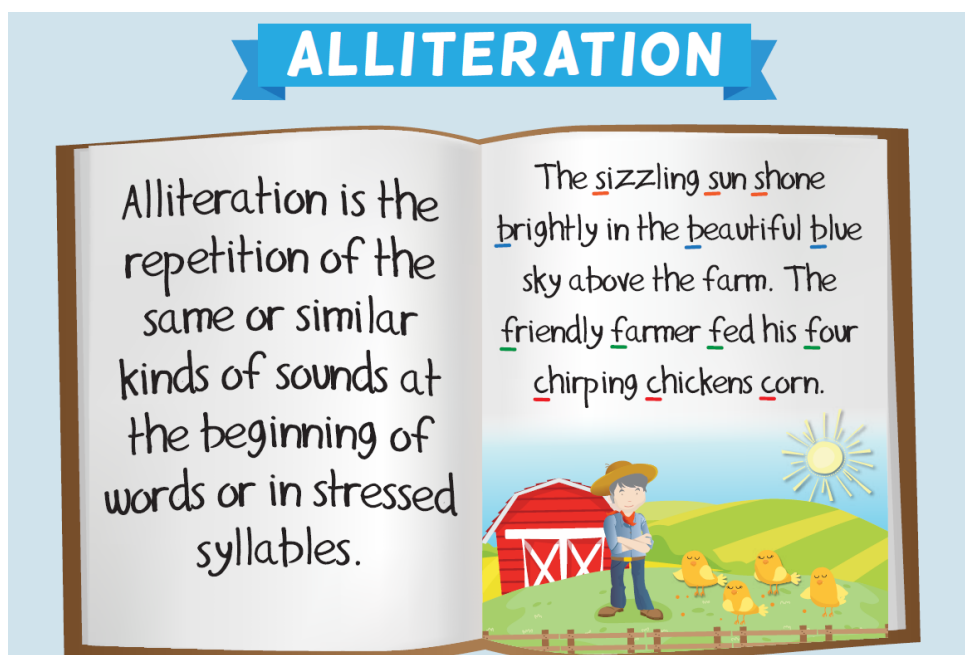
Alliteration is when you use the same sound at the beginning of words in a sentence.

Big Bob's Bargain Barn!
Cheeky Chirpy Chickens.
Crispy Kellog's Cornflakes.

Alliteration is often used when writing a **persuasive text!** We use alliteration in persuasive writing to convince the reader of our opinion.

For example:

*I undoubtedly believe that homework should be compulsory.
It is fantastic, fabulous and fun.*

The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark - Alliteration

Alliteration is when the first sound or letter for each word in a series of words is the same.

In the story 'The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark', the author Jill Tomlinson describes Plop as having **knackety knees**. This is an example of alliteration!
