














Year 5 Unit 1 - What's in a Name?

Please find below some learning tasks that are linked to the Australian Curriculum for Japanese. Students can complete some or all of the activities as they choose. Why are we doing this?

- To consolidate language we have covered in Term 1.
- To learn some Japanese culture.
- To continue using Japanese while learning from home.



<p>Create a song to teach someone how to introduce themselves in Japanese.</p> 	<p>List as many facts as you can about the Tokyo Olympics.</p> 	<p>Practise introducing yourself in Japanese. Include the sentences with your whole name, surname, first name, nickname and meaning of your name. You may like to record it.</p> 	<p>Draw around your hand in your book – write new words in the fingers, a question you have in the thumb and a sentence about what you have learnt in the palm.</p> 	<p>A kabuto is a helmet that was worn by samurai warriors. You will need square paper to make this; you can make that from any piece of rectangular paper. Refer to the directions in the glossary.</p> 
 <p>Design a 'Wanted' poster showing all the sentences you can say about yourself.</p>	<p>Write hiragana characters using a different colour for each stroke (chart on glossary)</p> 	<p>Read the story of Momotaro and write an alternative ending (in English).</p>  <p>https://web-japan.org/kidsweb/folk/index.html</p>	<p>Write a letter/email/note to someone about why you love Japan/Japanese.</p>  <p>I ♥ JAPAN</p>	<p>Practice the kanji characters for the numbers 1 – 10 using whatever you have at home.</p>

What are 5 possible questions?</p> 	<p>Haiku are Japanese poems, 3 lines long and each line has a set amount of syllables – 5/7/5.</p> <p>CAN YOU HAIKU?</p> <p>5 7 5</p> <p>Write a haiku in English about yourself.</p>	<p>Make an 'arigatou gozaimasu' (thank you) card or poster for someone.
